2023 is a significant year, for me personally it marks my 7th year working with LFIS, my first as Team Leader, but more excitingly the 29th year of LFIS serving the church of Leeds in our vision and mission to young people. As we near a new decade LFIS finds itself at a critical moment in our journey and development, one for which we need your continuing support.

Over these past two years post covid we've seen an increasing openness to our work with desire and demand for our team's support in schools growing significantly. We've also seen day in and day out the desperate need for Hope and Good News in the schools here in our city.

That openness is specifically highlighted in the request from two of our partner schools to increase our committed time within their communities. We're also in conversation with a further 3 new schools who'd like to partner with us moving forward, opportunities we find ourselves unable to say 'yes' to due to our current financial position and diminishing budget.

It's with that in mind that we are seeking to raise enough funds for an additional Schoolsworker. Growing our capacity in this way would not only enable us to say "YES!" to these opportunities, but also release our existing team in different parts of the city to grow connections into new schools. These are developments we've had to hold back from to due to our limited capacity in this season. We aim to raise an additional £30,000 over the coming months. To enable this to happen we'd like to ask you to prayerfully consider if you could assist us in doing this, not for the sake of LFIS, but so that we as the church in this city can further reach this next generation with the 'Good News' of Jesus.

We so greatly appreciate the immense support and encouragement we receive from our supporters, as well as your vital prayer support. Thank you so much!

As we set out into this next decade of serving young people, please would you keep walking with us as we seek to be 'Good News to the schools of Leeds', and invite others you know to join in and become part of God's provision in the season ahead?

'What does Christmas mean?' - This was the big question that we asked in our Christmas lessons this year. We considered the perspective of Mary, the shepherds, the wise men, and Jesus, to find out what Christmas might have meant to each of them. With these perspectives in mind, we took time with each class to reflect on what Christmas might mean to us, giving each student time to consider how the experiences of characters in the Christmas story could change or affect the way they think about Christmas Day.

We had lots of fun recreating the nativity with each class, getting students dressed up with Mary, an angel, the baby Jesus, a wise man, and a shepherd, wandering the classroom as we played games, watched videos and explored the story together.

As part of this year lesson we had the opportunity to show the Alpha video of scientist Francis Collins talking about his study of the evidence for Christ, a journey from atheist to a man of faith. A powerful message to share with students, especially those who believe that science and faith don't go together.

Please pray for all the students who were provoked by the message of our lesson, that they would be excited to consider who Jesus really is and how He can transform their lives.







Corpus Christi Retreat Day

Mentoring Multiplies

The reality of the state of teens' emotional health in schools By Louisa Lawrence

Since we returned to schools following the pandemic, we have found that there is a higher demand for one-to-one mentoring to support vulnerable and struggling students. This has been particularly apparent to me in my role at Guiseley School.

Since schools reopened after the 3rd national lockdown in March 2021, I have been working in Guiseley 2 days a week, purely for individual mentoring. This is quite a contrast to the half a day a week of mentoring I had been asked to do before the first lockdown. There has been a definite shift in the kinds of issues that we are seeing young people deal with in our mentoring sessions. You may have heard the phrase 'mental health crisis' used over the last few years and, as LFIS schools workers, we are seeing the reality of that for high school age students. All the schools we work in have a waiting list of students who they would like to have mentoring, but often we end up meeting with the more urgent cases (quite rightly) and students can end up waiting for a long time before they have someone to talk to regularly. In Matthew 25:40 Jesus says,

'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.'

Please pray for us as we continue to meet with students who are struggling through life now. Please pray for each member of the team that we would feel supported ourselves as we have tough conversations with students, and pray for the mentees themselves, that they would be able to move forward and see something of Jesus in us spending time with them.
